A NON-BINDING RESOLUTION VOICING SUPPORT FOR HAZARD PAY FOR CIVIL CITY AND UTILITY EMPLOYEES WORKING IN HARMS WAY DURING COVID-19 HEALTH CRISIS

**WHEREAS,** the COVID-19 pandemic is a national crisis which has stretched society outside of the normal limits of activity and behavior; and

**WHEREAS,** the City of Fort Wayne has worked diligently to be on the forefront of policy and process to ensure that city workers are safe throughout the crisis by expanding upon federal leave policy and providing safe conditions for city workers, and by extension citizens; and

**WHEREAS**, while some city workers have jobs that can be done from home, as directed by Governor Eric Holcomb, many city workers have responsibilities that requires them to work outside of their homes, and some have jobs that require them to be in public, outside of secure government buildings, potentially interacting with residents; and

WHEREAS, these jobs include, but are not limited to Street Department and other Public Works workers who are actively working on city streets and public concerns, Neighborhood Code Compliance officers and Animal Care & Control officers who are still responding to calls, City Utility crews who are responding to resident concerns with water and sewer issues, Parking Control officers working in the neighborhoods and on city streets, Parks employees who are maintaining our park system, and others; and

**WHEREAS**, Citizens Square was shut down on March 18<sup>th</sup> after Governor's Executive Orders 20-02 (Declaring a Public Health Crisis) and 20-04 (Further Orders and Directives in Response to the Coronavirus), and the passage of R-18-20 approving COVID-19 Employee and Operations Policy to provide the safest possible working environment for all employees, however many employees, including but not limited to the above listed, have continued to work in the field potentially interacting with residents; and

**WHEREAS**, these employees were identified several weeks back and have continued to work in public while the Employee and Operations Policy has been in effect; and

**WHEREAS**, other governmental units in the surrounding area has proposed providing additional compensation for those workers who have jobs that require them to have possible interaction with the public that cannot be mitigated by usual processes such as limiting group numbers, meetings, or appropriate distancing; and

**WHEREAS**, Governor Holcomb announced on May 1 that \$300 million dollars in federal reimbursement funds would be coming into communities as reimbursement for COVID-19 expenditures.

## NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FORT WAYNE, THAT:

**SECTION 1.** The Fort Wayne City Council believes that appropriate supplemental hazard pay for workers who have been deemed essential, work regularly scheduled hours in the field, are at high risk for coming into contact with residents who may have been exposed to COVID-19 because of the nature of their work outside of city-owned buildings. These hazards are not included in the employee job descriptions and therefore a supplemental payment is appropriate.

**SECTION 2.** The Fort Wayne City Council requests that the city executive branch work with departments to identify which employees have continued to work in roles that require exposure to the outside world where normal "office" mitigation options are not possible. These employees should be compensated with an additional Hazard Pay stipend. Both non-exempt and exempt employees should be eligible for supplemental benefits.

**SECTION 3**. The Fort Wayne City Council requests that the city executive branch and appropriate staff work with members of Council to fully delineate an appropriate policy and/or expansion or modification to the salary grid, to compensate the identified employees. This should include, but not be limited to: an identified and defined, standard hourly wage adjustment paid on top of regular hourly wages, recommended to be \$2.50/hour. This should be paid retroactively for all hours worked back to March 18th, to the present in one lump sum. Moving forward, the supplemental Hazard Pay can be placed on weekly payroll for the duration of the policy.

**SECTION 4.** The Fort Wayne City Council requests that appropriate departments report back to Council within one week, via email, the number of employees impacted by this request as well as the estimated fiscal impact, understanding that supplemental pay will come from existing budgets to be reassessed after the COVID crisis passes. Council understands that there may need to be additional requests for appropriations later in the year to cover overages, but anticipates that departments will make ever attempt to balance their existing budgets.

**SECTION 5**. Since the end of this crisis is unknown, the Fort Wayne City Council believes the policy this body is requesting to be created should be re-evaluated every 90 days with a beginning date of March 18<sup>th</sup>, 2020, with the policy ending if it is not expressly extended.
