A NONBINDING RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF THE NORTHERN INDIANA PASSENGER RAIL ASSOCIATION (NIPRA) AND THEIR ADVOCATION FOR THE RETURN OF PASSENGER RAIL SERVICE TO FORT WAYNE, INDIANA.

WHEREAS, the Northern Indiana Passenger Rail Association (NIPRA), is a legally recognized not for profit organization in the State of Indiana and is made up entirely of volunteer board members and general supporters; and

WHEREAS, NIPRA has long advocated for the return of passenger rail service to Fort Wayne, commencing at the Baker Street Train Station downtown; and

WHEREAS, based on a Business Plan and Feasibility Study, there is great potential to serve thousands of citizens with train travel to Chicago and other cities; and

WHEREAS, the Midwest Rail Initiative identifies Chicago to Fort Wayne and Columbus, Ohio a key link in providing passenger rail service to millions of citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Midwest Rail Initiative and NIPRA identifies potential passenger rail stops in Fort Wayne, Warsaw, Plymouth, Valparaiso, and the Gary Regional Airport, as a key economic development project that would continue to revitalize the aforementioned cities, and Northern Indiana; and

WHEREAS, the Business Plan and Feasibility Study prepared by the firm of Transportation Economic and Management Systems (TEMS) identifies that thousands of construction jobs could be created with making this rail connection, and that 27,000 permanent jobs could be created in Northern Indiana and Ohio over a period of 30 years with the addition of this passenger rail line; and

WHEREAS, federal funding for this Northern Indiana route will yield a return of \$1.71 for every dollar invested in the line, not to mention various benefits to freight train service that currently uses this line; and

WHEREAS, the Whitley County Steel Dynamics plant is a large producer of rail for passenger and freight lines, and, there are many railroad suppliers in Indiana and Ohio that will benefit from supplying rolling stock, rail, and parts for this project; and

WHEREAS, Amtrak has expressed repeated interest in the Chicago to Fort Wayne to Columbus route and has a parts and repair center located in Beech Grove, Indiana; and

WHEREAS, with the passage of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021, there is some \$36 billion in federal money to be utilized with a state match (similar to President Eisenhower's Interstate Highway Act of 1956), of probably 80% to 20% state; and

WHEREAS, Mayor Tom Henry visited with Governor Eric Holcomb, and the governor expressed interest in this plan with a state match; and

WHEREAS, NIPRA board members Jack Daniel, Fred Lanahan, and Geoff Paddock met with Mike Smith, the Commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation on July 7 to ask INDOT to apply for these federal funds for this route; and

WHEREAS, a Tier I Environmental Impact Study and a partial Tier II Preliminarily Engineering Study have been conducted at the direction of NIPRA, which is a requirement of the Federal Railroad Administration; and

WHEREAS, the Fort Wayne City Council voted in November 2014, 9-0, to support a bill authored by Councilman Geoff Paddock to put \$200,000 to begin work on the aforementioned studies, and that Allen County government contributed \$50,000, and then other public and private money was raised for this cause; and

WHEREAS, there are significant benefits to passenger rail travel, including reducing air pollution by ensuring fewer automobiles on the roads; and

WHEREAS, Councilman Geoff Paddock has personally spoken with a representative in the office of U.S. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg regarding this project, and the U.S. Department of Transportation is interested in working with INDOT.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FORT WAYNE:

Section 1. Respectfully requests that Commissioner Smith and the Indiana Department of Transportation work with Secretary Buttigieg and the U. S. Department of Transportation to apply for 80% of the proposed amount of money needed to make infrastructure improvements across 150 miles in Northern Indiana, or about \$750 to \$800 million. This amount being a portion of the approximate \$36 Billion available for passenger rail upgrades across the United States through the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021.
